Sunday, November 30th (first Sunday of Advent) Isaiah 2:1-5 / Psalm 122 / Romans 13:11-14 / Matthew 24:36-44 (written by Denise)

Isaiah 2:5 O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the LORD!

This verse could serve as a reminder that we belong and are being called upon by our LORD. We are defiantly being invited to act upon our trust, faith and love of the LORD. Deuteronomy 30:14 No, the word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and in your heart for you to observe.

Tuesday, December 2nd Amos 3:1-11 / Psalm 5, 6 / 2 Peter 1:12-21 / Matthew 21:12-22 (written by Denise)

2 Peter 1:21 ...because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke for God.

My first question is how do I know that the Holy Spirit is speaking to me or if it is another of the many voices from the committee in my head? 2 Peter 3:8 But do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day.
