**Sunday, December 28**<sup>th</sup> Isaiah 61:10---62:3 / Psalm 147 or Psalm 147:13-21 / Galatians 3:23-25; 4:4-7 / John 1:1-18 (written by Denise)

Isaiah 61:11 For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord GOD will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

Monday, December 29<sup>th</sup> (Holy Innocents) Jeremiah 31:15-17 / Psalm 124 / Revelation 21:1-7 / Matthew 2:13-18 (written by Denise)

Matthew 2:16 When Herold saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, he was infuriated and sent and killed all children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had learned from the wise men.
